

The Louisiana Animal Control Advisory Task Force Shelter Best Practices Self-Assessment

Introduction

The Louisiana Animal Control Advisory Task Force (LACATF) is committed to improving the quality of Louisiana public animal shelters and agencies. What is the Louisiana Animal Control Advisory Task Force (LACATF)?

The Louisiana Animal Control Advisory Task Force (R.S. 3:2364) was statutorily created in 2017 within the Louisiana Department of Agriculture and Forestry under the direction of the state veterinarian. The LACATF is dedicated promoting the proper treatment and well-being of animals. LACATF's work is focused on improving animal control agencies and shelters, supporting law enforcement, promoting education, formulating solutions to address pet overpopulation, and supporting animal control agencies in their efforts to build strong relationships within their communities. What is the Animal Control Shelter Inspection Program?

The Animal Control Shelter Inspection Program, administered by the Louisiana Department of Agriculture and Forestry, is a comprehensive shelter inspection program that provides recommendations to Louisiana animal control agencies/shelters on how to provide a high quality, effective, shelter to the communities they serve. The shelter inspection is pursuant to the Minimum Standards for Animal Shelters(R.S. 3:2461). In addition, the program assesses the shelter's participation in the voluntary Louisiana Animal Shelter Registry and Shelter Counts Basic Animal Data Matrix (R.S. 3:2366). The program ensures that shelters receive and are knowledgeable of the Louisiana Minimum Standards for public animal shelters (R.S. 2461) and are compliant with the requirements of laws pertaining to emergency planning and preparedness.

What is the purpose of Shelter Best Practices Self-Assessment?

The shelter self-assessment checklist is a tool designed to allow agencies to evaluate their compliance, knowledge, and understanding of the Louisiana Revised Statues, Louisiana Administrative Code, National Animal Care & Control Guidelines, and Guidelines for Standards of Care in Animal Shelters by the Association of Shelter Veterinarians. This document enables agencies to evaluate their performance and provide awareness of the industry's best practices.

R.S. 3:2464 Shelter Construction

(1) Heating. Indoor housing facilities for dogs or cats shall be sufficiently heated when necessary to protect the dogs or cats from cold, and to provide for their health and comfort. The ambient temperature shall not be allowed to fall below fifty degrees Fahrenheit for dogs and cats not acclimated to lower temperatures. (2) Ventilation. Indoor housing facilities for dogs and cats shall be adequately ventilated to provide for the health and comfort of the animals at all times. Such facilities shall be provided with fresh air either by means of windows, doors, vents, or air conditioning and shall be ventilated so as to minimize drafts, odors, and moisture condensation. Auxiliary ventilation, such as exhaust fans and vents of air conditioning, shall be provided when the ambient temperature is eighty-five-degrees Fahrenheit or higher.

Formula for Determining Kennel Staffing Needs

(Human Population)	Multiplied by 7% =	(Incoming Animal Population Per Year)
(Incoming Animals Per Year)	Divided by 365 (days per year)	(Incoming Animals Per Day)
(Incoming Animals Per Day)	Times Day Holding Period =	(Animals in Shelter Per Day)
(Animals in Shelter Per Day)	Times fifteen minutes** per animal =	(Number of Minutes Needed)
(Minutes Needed)	Divided by 60 (minutes) =	(Number of Hours Needed)
(Number of Hours Needed)	Divided by 3*** (hours for cleaning/feeding) =	(Staff Needed Per Day)

Sterilization Required

R.S.3: 2472 A. Provisions shall be made for sterilization all dogs and cats sold or released for adoption or purchased from any public or private animal shelter or animal control agency operated by a humane society or by a parish, city, or other political subdivision by either: (1) Providing sterilization by a Louisiana licensed veterinarian before relinquishing custody of the animal or (2) Entering into a written agreement with the adopter or purchaser guaranteeing that sterilization will be performed by a Louisiana licensed veterinarian in compliance with a sterilization agreement that shall contain the following:(a) the date of the agreement,(b) the name, address, and signature of the releasing agency and the adopter, (c)description of the animal to be adopted, (d)a sterilization completion date which shall be either(i) the thirtieth day after the day of adoption in the case of an adult animal or(ii) the thirtieth day after a specified date estimated to be the date an adopted infant female or male puppy or kitten becomes six months of age.
